

THE EX-KAISER.

BRITISH PRESSURE ON HOLLAND.

Sir Auckland Geddes, speaking at Andover last night, said that the Government intended to get the Kaiser out of Holland, put on his trial, and whatever penalty was allotted to him carried out. But if on the basis of international law Holland definitely said "No," and that she intended to provide an asylum for him within her territory, then we must say that he could not live in Dutch territory in Europe, and she would have to put him in some island belonging to her outside Europe.

ALLIED NOTE TO HOLLAND.

PARIS, Feb. 4.—The *Petit Parisien*, discussing the Allies' demand to Holland for the surrender of the ex-Kaiser, says:—

The Note drafted by the Council of Ambassadors is framed in vigorous terms and in a particular manner which betrays strongly an Anglo-Saxon origin.

The report of a foreign newspaper to the effect that France has taken the initiative in demanding the extradition of the ex-Kaiser and is now the only Power insisting upon this *démarche* is absolutely untrue.—*Reuter.*
