## NEW ARMISTICE NOTE.

### FIVE MORE LIGHT CRUISERS DEMANDED.

BERLIN, Nov. 5.—The text is published of a Note from the Supreme Council, which has been handed to the German Peace Delegation.

The Note makes it a condition of the draft protocol to the Peace Treaty and the consequent coming into force of the Treaty that Germany shall sign a second protocol specifying the fulfilment of the obligations imposed by the armistice agreement.

It points out a number of such obligations which Germany has failed to fulfil or has only partially fulfilled, and it therefore makes various demands, including the surrender of

Five light cruisers:

400,000 tons of floating docks, tugboats, and dredgers.

The crews of the warships scuttled at Scapa Flow are also to be detained. Coercive measures are threatened in the event of a refusal of these demands.

The Berlin morning papers term these demands a fresh extortion.—*Reuter.*
